- —I also found 32 other versions of the test published by people like Joe Bryan (May 1), "John C" (May 14), the Bayshore Baptist Church (on South Drive in an undisclosed city), and "a friend in California," on dates ranging between May 13 and August 18.
- The article was published in the August 2002 issue of *L.A. Mentary*, the newsletter of Greater Los Angeles-Area Mensa, under the pseudonym of a GLAAM member.

They also hate the brother because he lives among the midgets and manages to be more successful than they are (with their perfect religion) — even though they're all trying to destroy the brother, or at least want to. Moreover, it really *isn't* about religion; that's just the toe-chopper's rationalization. True practitioners of the midget's religion take it seriously. The midget and his minions enjoyed such "giant" entertainments as strip joints, karaoke clubs, and, in Florida, lap-dancing. There is nothing in the midget's holy books in favor of strip clubs and lap-dancing. 
