

HAPPY NEW YEAR! THAT SEEMS odd to say, as it is not yet Christmas when I am writing it. In fact, I am writing this from Arizona, shortly after the 4th quarter AMC meeting. One thing that was a point of concern to many of you at this AMC meeting was the motion to begin an "Angel Fund" at the national level. Those of you who communicated your feelings to me will be pleased to

know that the motion failed. Even so, from time to time there are members unable to pay dues who would benefit from some assistance. These members may be elderly or those with unexpected medical or other catastrophic expenses. Many of these members are folks who have given many volunteer hours to the organization. Hopefully more of our local groups will take it on their shoulders to assist such members. I encourage you to consider this.

Project Inkslinger is gearing up for major involvement with restocking libraries around the gulf region when they are rebuilt. The national coordinator told the AMC that he knows that many local groups have an Inkslinger coordinator, but he doesn't have their contact information. To build this network, if your group has someone doing Inkslinger, please either let the national office know, or let me know and I will pass it on.

For National Testing Day, Region 10's results were disappointing. The region with the most candidates tested within the testing window tested more than 200. Region 10 tested the least of any region, with 53 candidates. I credit this poor showing to the fact that 1/3 of our groups were seriously affected by Wilma just before this testing. We will do better next year!

Many of our groups received a notice from National Office that it was time to review the bylaws and bring them into compliance with minimum standards as needed. Let me know if you need any assistance with this review and revision.

Next month is Valentime in Destin, Florida, up in the panhandle. Details are available on their website (Northwest Florida) and on the

Region 10 website (*region10.us.mensa.org*). And coming up in April is the next MindGames, this time in Portland, Oregon. Details are available on the national website.

Congratulations are in order for Howard Prince and the IT team at the national office. The website has received a national award for excellence. Kudos!

NEW AND UPDATED WEB SERVICES

IN AN ONGOING EFFORT TO bring members together online and around the country, we're happy to announce an expansion of the online member directory and improvements to online address and information updates!

MEMBER PROFILE

(www.us.mensa.org/profile and www.us.mensa.org/PDQ)

If you haven't been to the Web site recently, we've updated the way we collect address and information changes. You may recall the days of updating your address online when you weren't really sure what address or phone number we had on file. By visiting <code>www.us.mensa.org/profile</code> or by clicking "Members," then "Member Profile," you'll have immediate access to your member information as on file at the National Office. This information includes address, phone and email, privacy releases, PDQ responses, and a few new fields -- related to your employment and education -- that we hope we can use to bring members together online.

You'll want to note that we standardize addresses and phone number formatting. Standardizing addresses maximizes discounts for Local Groups and national mailings. Also, note that updates received at the National Office via phone calls or the U.S.P.S. will usually post online within one business day of entry.

• **MEMBERSHIP DIRECTORY** (www.us.mensa.org/directory)

We've transitioned the online membership directory to the new Web site, and with the transition, we've made a few improvements based on suggestions from members like you. If you've visited the directory before, you'll find that accessing released information is easier, and we've added searches by membership number (great when you need to verify information for gathering attendance or a local election), email address, occupation and interest!

Email addresses are now linked on the directory results pages, and if members provide Web site addresses, we'll link those there also. For those members who've chosen to release their Personal Data Questionnaire information, we're now displaying additional PDQ responses -- excluding the information we collect for statistical purposes only. As always, you can elect to not display information via your privacy releases on your "Profile Update" or via the PDQ.

Please be aware that we provide the membership directory to facilitate personal, non-commercial communication between members and for the benefit of their Local Groups, a respective regional Mensa group, Special Interest Group or American Mensa, Ltd. Concerns regarding abuse of this information should be directed to OnlineAbuse@americanmensa.org.

MEMBER BIOGRAPHIES

I did mention "new" services, didn't I? Very shortly, we'll be debuting member biographies in the membership directory and the profile collection process.

Have you felt that the Personal Data Questionnaire responses didn't cover everything about you? We hope that the addition of member-provided biographies will help this along. MINI MINUTES OF THE MEETING OF THE AMERICAN MENSA COMMITTEE (AMC) -

DECEMBER 3, 2005 - TEMPE, ARIZONA

APPOINTMENTS: **Ed Raper**, Gifted Children's Outreach Coordinator; **Alan Baltis**, Local Group Funding Task Force Chairman; and **Henry Miller**, Local Group Premises Feasibility Task Force Chairman. Committee Chairs appointed were: **Dr. John Sheehan**, Name & Logo; **Bob Beatty**, Structure Review; and **Dave Remine**, Hearings Review.

- A new volunteer position was created for a National Events Hotel Consultant to assist in hotel consulting and negotiations, if requested by a group interested in hosting a national Mensa event. This position will be effective April 1, 2006.
- The bid of the Denver Consortium to host the 2008 Annual Gathering in Denver, Colorado July 2-6, 2008, was accepted, subject to the receipt of Host and Hotel Contracts acceptable to the Executive Committee.
- AMC members who are not members of the Mensa International Board of Directors (IBD) will be funded for two additional days in order to attend the official IBD meeting and activities at the World Gathering in August, 2006.
- For the purposes of reporting income and expenses, local groups that exceed the IRS threshold for nonprofit organizations (currently \$25,000) in annual gross revenue shall be included in the financial activity of AML, for annual reporting to the IRS. Local groups that have been granted a separate IRS filing status shall report this activity to the IRS as required and also provide a copy of the IRS form to the Mensa national office. In the event of a local group hosting a national event (Annual Gathering, Colloquium, or other activity), it shall be included in the financial activity of AML or the Mensa Education and Research Foundation.

Policy for internet communications was amended to remove the ban on electronic versions of member directories for Local Groups, provided these are only available for download via the secure web site under the auspices of Internet Services. The AMC will hold an annual planning session each year in Arlington, Texas, at the fall AMC meeting, beginning in 2007.

Proposed amendments to the Bylaws of American Mensa, Ltd. that will enable electronic voting will be submitted to a special referendum of the members.

The next meeting of the AMC will be March 24-26, 2006, in Greenville, South Carolina.


